
Hello friends,

Unfortunately, we are not currently open to the public, but we have been coming in to Magnolia on a staggered schedule and still managing to get quite a lot accomplished. We thought we would put together a newsletter to let you know what we've been up to as we continue to move forward with public art and publishing projects. It turned out that we have so much "news," we have to make this Part One of Two.

First, congratulations to **Rupert Garcia** and the Rena Bransten Gallery. *Obama from Douglass* (2010) has been acquired by the Smithsonian American Art Museum and *Hoodwinked*, (2017) is now in the collection of the Smithsonian National Portrait Gallery. Both pieces were produced at Magnolia Editions.

Meanwhile, a public art project several years in the making is currently being installed at Webster Eleven, a large apartment complex in downtown Oakland bound by 11th Street, 12th Street, Webster Street and Harrison Street. A stretch of the building spanning the length of of two city blocks will be clad with ceramic tiles designed by artist **Julie Chang** and printed and fired at Magnolia Editions by Master Printer **Tallulah Terryll**, with assistance from **Arlene Suda** and various other Magnolians. A massive job...!

Magnolia also helped fabricate the glass installation pictured below by artist/architect **Daniel Winterich** at 1100 Broadway, on the corner of 12th and Broadway in downtown Oakland. The lower design of the glass is based on the geometry of a Live Oak acorn cap, emblematic of Oakland:

Master Printer **Nicholas Price** made the cut files and carved 10 molds using our CNC alongside **Miguel Mendoza** and **Gamiel Mendoza** of M2. The 45 pieces of glass, 45" x 140" each, were slumped by **Dorothy Lenehan** and **Kimberly Jackman** of Lenehan Architectural Glass. M2 is across the street from Magnolia and Lenehan Architectural Glass is around the corner, so it was a community undertaking (locally sourced).

Emory Douglas, Minister of Culture for the Black Panther Party from 1967 through to when the Party disbanded in the 1980s, came to Magnolia Editions during shelter-in-place to work on his piece *Respect Mother Earth*, chosen by the San Francisco Arts Commission for the Margaret Hayward Playground on Laguna Street in San Francisco.


The artwork "RESPECT MOTHER EARTH" is a new graphic design concept inspired by a historical graphic I created in 1969 titled, "Paperboy" "All Power To The People".

The focus of that 1969 image was the Paperboy figure holding up a newspaper with the headline "ALL POWER TO THE PEOPLE" in bold text covering the entire front page.

Due to the broad appreciation for the Paperboy image that transcended borders and communities because of its visual message and aesthetic, it became the inspiration for creating this graphic. "RESPECT MOTHER EARTH" speaks a visual language about global warming as a universal concern. The color palette and design elements in the artwork are meant to be visually stimulating and thought providing.





Fantastic Utopias

Don and Era Farnsworth were invited to participate in the *Gatherings Project*, a fundraiser to benefit artists who could use assistance during the Covid pandemic. *Gatherings* is an art and poetry based project that experiments with a cycle of giving and receiving. The project began with 51 professional artists (making a total of 56 boxes) and 53 poets contributing original poems.

Our box, *Unseen*, has two heartfelt poems by **Tori Miner**, a beautiful note from **Pico lyer** (which actually brought tears to my eyes) addressed to artists of all types, which was obtained by our friends **Darlene Markovich** and **Ron Haak**, and other contributions which we have not seen yet, from artists **Amy Hibbs** and **Johnna Arnold**.

All 56 boxes with contents have been exhibited at <u>Patricia Rovzar Gallery</u> in Seattle and are traveling soon to Gail Severn Gallery, info below. It was a very fun project in the midst of Covid. Thank you, artist **Lynda Lowe**, for brainstorming and organizing this amazing project.
